This 7th annual continuing education program is sponsored by the American Board of Rehabilitation Psychology, Inc. and the Division of Rehabilitation Psychology of the American Psychological Association. The American Board of Rehabilitation Psychology, Inc. (ABRP) was established in 1995 and became fully affiliated with the American Board of Professional Psychology (ABPP) in 1997. It was established to conduct examinations leading to diplomate status in Rehabilitation Psychology. The Division of Rehabilitation Psychology was established in 1956 with the purpose of uniting all members of the American Psychological Association with interests in the rehabilitation and prevention of disability and chronic illness.

By the conclusion of this program, participants will:

1. Identify current trends and learn new skills in rehabilitation psychology practice;
2. Discuss recent research findings and their potential impact on service delivery;
3. Describe the key elements of ABPP/ABRP eligibility, the practice sample submission and review, the oral examination process, and characteristics of effective mentoring.
4. Recognize recent and pending changes in law and policy that affect service delivery and reimbursement;
5. Understand fundamental issues in ethics, cultural diversity, and pain management as applied to rehabilitation psychology.

Target Audience:

This course is designed for psychologists in practice and/or academic settings that focus on rehabilitation populations and for trainees (students, interns, and fellows) with interests in rehabilitation psychology. Course content will be directed at an intermediate skill level.

Course Fees:

The cost of the conference is \$225.00 (if registration is received by March 1); \$275.00 thereafter. Trainee (students, interns, and fellows) registration is \$50.00 before March 1 and \$95 thereafter; a letter verifying student status from the training program must accompany registration. Division 22 members and ABRP diplomates receive a \$25.00 discount on registration fees. Checks should be made payable to "American Board of Rehabilitation Psychology." A full refund will be available until March 1, 2005. No refunds are available after that date.
